

Proclamation

by Governor Jim Justice

- Whereas,** autism spectrum disorder affects an estimated 1 in 36 children and there are approximately 10,000 autistic children in West Virginia; and
- Whereas,** a pilot study conducted in 1999-2000 in a six-county area in West Virginia found that nearly 21 of every 10,000 children aged 3-21 years had an autism spectrum disorder; and
- Whereas,** autism is a complex condition that affects each person differently, resulting in unique strengths and challenges; and
- Whereas,** autism can cause challenges with verbal and nonverbal communication, social interaction, and repetitive behaviors; and
- Whereas,** early diagnosis and interventions that are tailored to each individual's needs can have lifelong benefits, easing the transition to adulthood by fostering greater independence; and
- Whereas,** each person and family affected by autism should have access to reliable information and support; and
- Whereas,** autistic people should have opportunities to reach their full potential; and
- Whereas,** the Great State of West Virginia is honored to take part in the annual observance of *World Autism Awareness Day* to address the diverse needs of individuals with autism and their families.

Now, Therefore, Be it Resolved that I, Jim Justice, Governor of the Great State of West Virginia, do hereby proclaim *April 2, 2024* as:


World Autism Awareness Day
