Senator Capito,

On behalf of the people of West Virginia, I would like to thank you for your careful consideration of the health care bill before the Senate. With so much at stake, it takes great leadership to do what's right for so many people who stand to lose essential health services in West Virginia.

While the impacts outlined in the Congressional Budget Office report are cause for serious concern, the reality is things are worse than they seem. I want you to be fully aware of the impact the current legislation would have on the state we both love.

Since so many of our people count on Medicaid, any cut to Medicaid would destroy families in West Virginia. We can't put the 175,000 West Virginians who benefit from the Medicaid expansion at risk of losing coverage. The consequences would be beyond catastrophic.

In the face of our drug epidemic, fewer people would have access to drug treatment programs under the current proposal. As the debate moves forward, I hope you and your colleagues will consider the fact that it will only make it harder to combat the drug problem that's ravaging West Virginia.

Even more concerning is that our state Legislature just cut \$54 million from West Virginia's Medicaid budget and backfilled it with voodoo, one-time money— it's a total shell game. That means any federal cut to Medicaid would cripple our people even more. Our state Legislature refused to listen to my repeated warnings about slashing the state's Medicaid budget and their recent actions could be the straw that breaks the camel's back.


